## **Project M.E.O.W. Has the Purrfect Cat for You**

The cats need your help -- and so do we!

We are Project M.E.O.W. (Make Every One Wanted) and we rescue abandoned cats and kittens.

Normally, that means making up for irresponsible pet owners. You know, the ones who take a kitten because it's so cute and so much fun to watch, but six months down the road -- when "Tiger" or "Fluffy" needs to be "fixed" and the behavior isn't so cute anymore -- that furry bottom is out on the street.

But these are not normal times. This tough economy has made life difficult for humans, so even folks who really care about their pets are feeling desperate. As a result, more and more cats are being dumped in shelters – or on the street. Either way, their lives tend to be miserable and shortened.

Right now, every rescue group I know is overwhelmed, including our's, which serves the Spruce Hill community. There isn't a square inch of foster space or an empty cage to spare, and yet the Internet pleas continue endlessly for us to take "just one more."

We need homes! Adoptions are the ideal, of course, but short-term foster homes are also a godsend because we are so cramped for space. (Donations help, too.) And guess what? If you make a little room in your home for a homeless cat or kitten, you might find a big, new, wonderful place in your heart!

Our adoption fee is \$85, which covers a lot of medical care. Your cat will be spayed/neutered, test negative for FIV (feline AIDS) and for cat leukemia, have all its shots, and be flea-free.

## **Construction Projects Advance**

Several big issues have come before the committee since our last newsletter report, and several are pending.

A proposed development to expand and add floors to the International Store at 4203 Walnut Street first came

to the committee in January, 2008. It and has gone through a series of meetings with the committee, discussions with the City Planning



Commission, and several continuances before the city's Zoning Board of Adjustment. After much discussion and some architectural re-design, all parties signed off on the development and it was accepted by the ZBA.

Now the committee is considering a

proposed use for the former Rite Aid at 43<sup>rd</sup> and Walnut, which has been vacant for a couple years. Bravo Health, a health management plan that serves Medicaid patients and seniors in the community, is in final discussions.

Other pending items include signage for Makkah Market at 43<sup>rd</sup> and Walnut, an application for a variance to develop the mansion at 42<sup>nd</sup> and Pine into three units and, farther down the road, a proposal for an extended stay hotel on the 4100 block of Walnut Street.

All these items will be updated in future reports, following meetings with the applicants and immediate neighbors.

## **Beautify Your Block**

It's not too soon to start planning to apply for a grant to improve the "streetscape" on your block. Join with your neighbors to plant street trees, create gardens or install planters.

Grants up to \$500 for a single block, and up to \$1,200 for cooperating adjacent blocks, require a dollar-for-dollar match of the grant amount through volunteer "sweat equity," donated materials or services, or cash donations. Funds for Spruce Hill's grant program come from the association's membership dues and fundraising events such as the May Fair.

# **A Critic of Spruce Hill Finds Plenty to Praise**

This column has become a bit heavy on criticism of our neighborhood and city. So this time, I'm going to sing praises:

• The new 2,500-square-foot playground at 47th and Sansom (a tad outside Spruce Hill) is a wonderful oasis for kids living nearby. The swings, slides, benches and cushioned groundcover were installed on



Aug. 6 by more than 200 volunteers from Home Depot, the Enterprise Center, the Walnut Hill Community Association, and the nonprofit organization KaBOOM! The Home Depot provided a \$61,000 grant and materials.



• A renter two houses away recently moved out, leaving a mountain of garbage bags and, strangely, wall-size sheets of plywood. He left the mess on the curb just hours after the weekly trash pickup, so it was sure to be ripped and scattered for days -- and then city trash collectors could refuse to collect it. Thank goodness for Dexter Bryant, director of operations for the University City District. After we called, he sent a clean-up crew that very day. They even swept the pavements!

• The Association of Islamic Charitable Organizations – better known as the Mosque at 44th and Walnut – has a full-time, state-accredited day school for children in elementary and middle grades. Several years ago, ACIP bought the defunct bank building on the corner opposite the mosque, planning to renovate it to house the school. It's great to see that construction is now underway.



• Hysni "Sam" Syla, an Albanian émigré, has become an urban renewal dynamo in my neighborhood. He is now finishing the renovation of five huge, formerly blighted properties at the corner of 45<sup>th</sup> and Chestnut, across from West Catholic High School. A block away, at 44<sup>th</sup> and Sansom, he turned a block-long eyesore into a residential-retail development. You can't miss his style if you drive by: smooth stucco painted in two-tone pastels, with striking balustrades and architectural moldings.



• The *Love Letter* project, a series of rooftop murals that runs along the Market-Frankford elevated transit line from 45<sup>th</sup> to 63<sup>rd</sup> Streets, is bringing attention to artist Stephen Powers, the Mural Arts program, and of course, West Philly. The innovative new mural project has been featured in The Philadelphia Inquirer, The New York Times and The Wall Street Journal.



• The former Rite Aid building on Walnut near 43<sup>rd</sup> Street – vacant for about two years – is slated to reopen as Bravo Health, a free-standing outpatient clinic that serves the needs of Medicare beneficiaries. Previous proposals for the site, including a liquor store and a flea market, were controversial and divisive, so bravo for Bravo's plans.
