Hotel Project Taking Unusual Zoning Route

Zoning Matters

The zoning committee is busy – as always – with a number of projects. Here's a rundown:

The hotel project slated for 4109 Walnut Street (formerly the 40th and Pine project) was reviewed by the committee at a meeting to which all nearby neighbors were invited. The current project is not following the traditional zoning route; rather, the developers asked Councilwoman Blackwell introduce an ordinance to rezoning the portion of the block from the existing lot east to 41st street. Since Campus Apartments owns the entire parcel, City Planning had asked that a master plan be developed for the entire site to reflect possible future construction. So, instead of testifying before ZBA, the community will have an opportunity to make known its views at hearings in City Council. The committee had a generally favorable reaction to the plans, but is the process of seeking clarifications on several points before recommending any position.

A proposal for a Barnes and Noble bookstore at University of the Sciences in Philadelphia

with an adjacent coffee counter on the south side of Woodland Avenue at 42nd street was postponed so that additional conversations could

take place between USP and a few concerned area merchants. We expect the meeting to be rescheduled in the near future, with sufficient notice so that all interested individuals will have an opportunity to attend.

Be a Mentor and Make a Difference

Would you like to make a crucial difference in a teenager's life?

If so, consider volunteering to be a mentor at West Philadelphia High School. The school is looking to match caring adults with ninth and tenth grade students who are at risk of dropping out and show moderate behavior problems.

The primary qualification is a sincere desire to be a reliable friend and role model to a student. A mentor should also be a good listener and communicator, nonjudgmental, a problem-solver, and respectful to persons of different backgrounds. Child abuse clearance and background checks will be required.

The mentoring program has an initial orientation and training session, followed by bi-monthly group training meetings. Each mentor is expected to meet with the student at least four hours a month for the rest of the school year, keep a log of contacts, and check in regularly with mentor staff to discuss progress and any problems.

As a mentor, you'll enjoy free attendance at various events and be eligible for incentive gifts. But the real reward is seeing a young person change for the better thanks to a relationship with you.

tea/coffee shop at 4329 Spruce Street, adjacent to Local 44. Agreement was reached on façade improvements for the structure and the committee gave its approval.

The committee agreed to the installation of temporary modules in the rear of buildings

> owned by the Restaurant School on the 4200 block of Walnut that would serve as student lounges. The committee requested a "letter

of understanding" be drawn up detailing how the operation would be monitored and controlled in order to protect the quality of life for Sansom Street residents whose houses face the site. The letter will cover a variety if issues that the committee insisted be committed to writing. We expect this to be wrapped up by the time you read this.

Finally, we had a hearing on March 24th in Common Pleas Court on Jack Gillespie's appeal of the city zoning board's rejection of an outdoor deck at Mill Creek Tavern. The case is now before Judge DeVito, who made it clear at the hearing that any and all cases related to Gillespie would be the exclusive province of his court, even when he leaves his current assignment in May. He will take the Gillespie file with him for any current or future action. Needless to say, we found this declaration by the judge to be breathtaking, and we could only speculate about the rationale. That said, we expect the case will be heard in late May. We will be prepared for any eventuality.

New Center Nurtures Food Biz

The Philadelphia Enterprise Center, the respected minority business accelerator located at 4548 Market Street, is in the process of creating the city's first food-business incubator.

The Center for Culinary Enterprises will transform a long-vacant supermarket building at 48th and Spruce Streets into a state-of-the-art 13,000-square-foot complex that will provide resources and programming for emerging food entrepreneurs

Among the plans for the CCE:

• An "e-Kitchen," a multimedia learning center with a demonstration kitchen and computer lab open to the public

• Three commercial kitchens for rent, equipped with cold and dry storage spaces

• Little Louie's BBQ, a full-service restaurant with a program for high school students


• Two retail spaces for community food businesses

• An urban mini-farm to tap into the local food system.

The center's goal is to will create 130 new permanent jobs within 24 months. Each year, it will train 100 youths in restaurant management and foster 20 new food ventures.

The need for the project is clear. A significant number of Philadelphians run informal food businesses

out of their homes, such as baking cakes or catering parties. However, they lack access to commercial kitchens, business training, and start-up capital, so they face persistent obstacles to building legitimate, successful enterprises. 
